Devotion in Action: A Tribute to Thomas G. Fahner

In January, longtime Kurn Hattin staff member, Principal Thomas Fahner, passed away at age 58 after a courageous battle with cancer. A friend to many, a devoted husband to our Athletic Director Donna Fahner, a loving father to three children; Kimberly, Kelly and Christopher, and cherished grandfather to Maggie, Tom will be remembered for, among other things, having the calling to help children succeed and thrive. It was said of Kurn Hattin's founder, Charles Albert Dickinson, "He took humanity into his heart." Those words ring true for Tom Fahner, who mentored countless boys and girls who came through Kurn Hattin's doors needing healing, nurturing and love.

I met Tom in 1989; he became employed at Kurn Hattin just one year after I came to work at the Homes in 1988. You could say we grew up together; we were young transplanted New Yorkers in our 30's, eager to make a mark in our chosen careers.

What was evident from the start, besides his brilliant red hair, was Tom's abundant and contagious enthusiasm for children. No child escaped his attention, and he quickly knew just what kind of nurturing they needed in order to have a good day and be successful. A touch on the shoulder, a few words spoken in the hallway during classes, an after school ball toss... in so many big and small ways Tom connected with kids, and with that connection, gave them hope.

Tom will be missed and remembered. An outpouring of testimonials from the graduates he helped have sustained all who loved Tom. And as was also said of our founder, we think of Tom in this way: "A finger plunged for an instant into the ocean...a rain drop brushing a rose petal...each, you think, leaves about as much impression behind as when your life work is done. But the end is only the beginning. Does not your work go on?"

8TH GRADE Class Trip

The 8th graders have the opportunity each year to attend an 8th Grade Class Trip on the last weekend before graduation.

The last few years the class trip has been to Cape Cod, Massachusetts. The New England Food Foundation allows us to use their beautiful retreat house in Sandwich for free. Past classes have enjoyed time at the beach, bike rentals and rides along the Cape Cod Rail Trails, a visit to the Woods Hole Aquarium, a whale watch and a visit to the Blue Man Group in Boston, Massachusetts to end our trip.

The 8th grade class raises much of the funds for this trip. This year we have a large class of 27 and we will have three chaperones attend the trip. Our housing is free and we will bring breakfast supplies. With a class of this size we have had to be creative in our fundraising efforts. The class sponsors 3 raffles each year. The prizes are usually generous donations from our staff. We have raffled a hand-made quilt every year for the past 6 years donated by Bev DeCamp, houseparent at Hubbard Cottage. We are lucky to have talented and generous staff. Along with the raffle the 8th graders have hosted a car wash, bake sale, Christmas Bazaar and a concession stand at the cross country races. Richard Johnson, our food service director and head chef, has done Friday soup and bread sales for staff to purchase. All the proceeds to the 8th grade class sponsor the Blue Man Group tickets.

Other fundraising efforts have been supported by staff. Our acting principal, Tom Fontaine, has been making clocks with the 8th graders. Each student took pictures around campus to use for the face of the clock. They then assembled wooden frames that Mr. Fontaine cut. The students sold the clocks at various events and we have almost sold out. One very generous person bought a clock for \$500 although most have sold for \$15. Tom Fontaine, and houseparents Sierra Sylvester-Patterson and Faith Crowe helped the students make fresh apple pies for Thanksgiving. The students used the apples from our orchard. Faith Crowe has also made various types of vegan breads including banana, zucchini and pumpkin bread that she made with some of the students. The breads were sold at Thanksgiving and Christmas. We have also received funds from several generous donors which are greatly appreciated.

Through all the generous donations, talents shared by our staff and the commitment from the 8th graders, we are on our way to an exciting class trip. The students are working hard to earn their points and have set a goal that all the 8th graders attend the trip. We have booked our Blue Man Group tickets and will start planning our other activities this month. We have students that have never been to the ocean, so that is high on our priority list. There are some entrance-free places we attend such as the Woods Hole Aquarium and the Oceanographic Institute and of course the wonderful Cape Cod seashore. We have a wonderful time and I'm amazed at all of the "firsts" which the students experience. They have their first time in the ocean, the first time they see swans swimming in the pond, the first drive-in, the first time at a zoo, and certainly the first time seeing the Blue Man Group; re-experiencing through the eyes of a child—what could be better!

Day Student Program PROVES TO BE A POSITIVE OPTION

Something new was added to the usual excitement of the first day of school in 2012—one of the new seventh graders was enrolled as a day student! After several years of inquiries about this possibility from local families, it had finally become a reality. As Westminster Center School sixth graders and their families considered their options for middle school under their town voucher program, many had asked whether Kurn Hattin could be included as one of their choices. Based on these requests, the decision was made to begin a pilot program for day students. Due to the success of this pilot, the fall of 2013 brought six more seventh and eighth grade day students from the town of Westminster to our campus. The expansion has continued during the current school year with yet another exciting development: two elementary grade students have enrolled as day students after their family requested that Kurn Hattin consider this possibility. With the addition of third and fourth grade students in 2014, the day student population has grown to eight.

Families of all the day students have told us that there are many reasons why they considered Kurn Hattin an exciting and very positive option for their children. They often mention the small class sizes in the school, the hands-on curriculum including the Farm Program, the extraordinary role that music plays as an integral part of the curriculum and campus life as well as the strong focus on independence, social skills and community service.

In the words of the family of our elementary school day students:

We are thrilled with our decision to enroll our girls at Kurn Hattin as day students. Our girls were adopted into our family as older children, their early years were not as stable as we would have wished. We knew immediately that they would need extra love and support in order to grow to their fullest potential. We were familiar with Kurn Hattin's focus on social skills. As a family, we knew that our girls would benefit from the structure that Kurn Hattin was able to offer. The first few weeks on the car ride to school, the girls would list the reasons why they were happy to be attending Kurn Hattin. They were making friends quickly! At home we were hearing them talk about putting napkins in their lap and using good table manners. We knew we had made the right decision. We can't say enough good about what Kurn Hattin offers their students. Thank you for making us all feel like part of the family.

Charles A. Dickinson AWARD

The Rite Aid Foundation Receives Kurn Hattin's 2014 Charles A. Dickinson Award

Kurn Hattin Homes for Children awarded the 2014 Charles Albert Dickinson Award to the Rite Aid Foundation for outstanding contributions to the health and welfare of children in need. The awards ceremony took place at our annual Christmas Visitor's Day on December 12th. Named for Kurn Hattin's founder, the annual award recognizes individuals and organizations that demonstrate a shared commitment to Kurn Hattin's mission of transforming the lives of children in need. Kurn Hattin's Executive Director, Connie Sanderson, presented the award, a beautifully inscribed glass coin sculpture on a pedestal, bearing a Dickinson bust created by nationally renowned artist Robert Dugrenier, saying, "The Rite Aid Foundation is a caring neighbor. They have donated over two million dollars to over 200 charities nationwide. Kurn Hattin is the grateful recipient of a \$10,000 **KidCents** grant and previous generous grants from Rite

Aid." Three representatives from the Rite Aid Foundation were present to accept the award: District Manager, Kylie Gould; Pharmacy District Manager, Nick Rebmann; and Store Manager, Jodi Cleveland. Nick Rebmann had high praise for the work of Kurn Hattin, "The KidCents program of the Rite Aid Foundation is designed to foster growth in the communities we serve and to improve the lives and wellbeing of children. There's no greater place than what we've experienced today at Kurn Hattin. From what we see in how that money is being utilized to help provide a great future and a great foundation to the children here at Kurn Hattin, I'm humbled to be here." To date, the Rite Aid Foundation has raised and donated over \$80 million for children through various programs and initiatives, such as the Children's Miracle Network and the KidCents program.

I had experiences and opportunities that I wouldn't have had otherwise. I learned to play the trombone. I became very athletic. I played basketball, and became a cross-country runner. I won first and second-place in two years."

At the end of her 8th grade year, Meranda was accepted to the Milton Hershey School in Pennsylvania, "Even though many of my friends graduated the year before me, several came back to see me graduate from



Kurn Hattin." Meranda's career choice was influenced by her own family. She has several nieces and nephews and really loves reading to and mentoring them. So she decided to focus her career plan on Early Childhood Care and Education and graduated in 2012 with a four-year scholarship for college.

Meranda returned to Springfield, Vermont and attends the New Hampshire Technical Institute in Concord. She has majored in Early Childhood Education, and will graduate in the spring. It was a busy semester. Red Ribbon Week was celebrated during the last week of October. Faculty and students discussed healthy life choices. The children were visited by several local speakers and attended workshops such as: "Tobacco Free" by Greater Falls Connections; "Bully Free" and "Addiction and Families" with Counseling Director Christine Danforth; "Alcohol and Other Drugs" by the Wellness Center staff; and "Healthy Choices." Visiting from New York and on break from Katy Perry's



world tour for the "Music and Wellness" workshops was Sound Engineer Pete Keppler (Pictured). Keppler described with touching honesty how he was able to confront his addictions and channel his energy into music to find a path to recovery. Pete moved on to mix and manage sound for musicians such as David Bowie, Steve Earle, Nine Inch Nails, and Katy Perry. Also during that week, Paula Roux of Visiting Nurses & Hospice of Vermont and New Hampshire stopped by to thank the students for their participation in their Wings of Hope Butterfly Release event by providing a pizza party. Earlier in September, on the Common in Lebanon, New Hampshire, the Kurn Hattin Choir had performed at the annual Wings of Hope event. The day included the release of live butterflies to honor friends and family who have passed. Kurn Hattin students sang several musical selections to bring comfort and healing to the individuals and families there remembering their loved ones. The children also wrapped up harvest season on the farm and prepped for winter by picking the last of the apple crop, pressing fresh cider, planting garlic, and digging potatoes. The children have hands-on participation in the production of their own food–sprouting, planting, harvesting, and preparation are all part of their education. Learning these skills not only produced tasty rewards, but also taught the children economic and agricultural sustainability. The end of October concluded with the children



marching in costume in the Westminster Halloween Parade, and celebrating the 103rd birthday of volunteer Mrs. Frank (Vivian) Prindl.

For Fall Sports the children participated in soccer, cross-country, equestrian programs, and other activities. Houseparent and Coach Deb Parsons advanced the skills of her girls' team, grades 3-4. The older girls' team, grades 7-8, demonstrated great teamwork. School Administrative Assistant and Coach Keri Newton's older boys' team had a good season, with new goalie, student Chris Deitz, protecting the boundaries of the

goal zone. This prompted chants at games from the crowd and his teammates of "Whose house? Deitz's house!" Keri and her team later presented Chris with a sweatshirt with the words "DEITZ'S HOUSE" emblazoned across the back in Kurn Hattin colors. This year's Soccer Coaches were: houseparents Ginger Cook, Co-Ed. Grades 3-4; Deb Parsons Co-Ed. Grades 5-6; Sierra Sylvester-Patterson, Girls Grades 7-8; and School Administrative Assistant Keri Newton, Boy's Grades 7-8. The Cross-Country Coach was Athletic Director Donna Fahner; Walking Club Instructors were Houseparents Faith Crowe and Bill McHugh; Art Teacher and Club Instructor Katy Hughes; Farm Manager and On-Campus Work Program Instructor Pat Barry; and the Equestrian Program Instructor Sarah Stine. Team sports, recreation and other physical activities are all important at Kurn Hattin.



The young musicians at Kurn Hattin Homes were busy performing at several musical venues this fall and winter. Always popular, the talents of Kurn Hattin's Select Choir, Children's Chorus, Jazz Ensemble and Marching Band were heavily in demand. The Select Choir performed at the annual Wings of Hope event for Visiting Nurse & Hospice of Vermont and New Hampshire in Lebanon, New Hampshire. The Marching Band and Color Guard helped kick off the annual Eastern States Fair and Exposition in Springfield, Massachusetts. Kurn Hattin's Jazz Ensemble and Select Choir embarked upon a whirlwind

tour. They performed a variety of uplifting songs for the residents of Riverwoods Retirement Community in Exeter, New Hampshire and for The Village Baptist Church of Kennebunkport in Maine. Accompanied by opera-trained vocalist Bruce Mast, they performed a varied repertoire of multi-part harmonies, ballads, and hymnals. The children also celebrated Kurn Hattin friend John Zimmerman's birthday at a delicious Sunday brunch, spontaneously serenading John at the table (Pictured). Seventeen of our most talented 7th and 8th grade vocalists were selected as members of the Connecticut River Valley District VI Middle School Chorus, participating in the 2014 Vermont Music Educators District VI Fall Music Festival in Bellows Falls, Vermont. The choral group, conducted by Becky Luce, performed internationally themed music selections with student singers from ten schools throughout Southeastern Vermont. Also, in true holiday spirit, the Kurn Hattin Music Department staff, volunteers and choir strolled through the village of Bellows Falls, Vermont singing traditional Christmas carols to the residents and business owners. All were surprised when Senator Peter Welch enthusiastically joined the children for a few holiday songs, before they were all treated to delicious sugar cookies and steaming cocoa at the Pierce Lawton Post 37 American

Legion. Holiday musical events culminated on Christmas Visitors' Day and Family Day before the holiday break. So many help to make the holidays bright.

Kurn Hattin held its Nineteenth Annual Veterans' Day Observance on November 11th. The program, coordinated by Social Studies teacher Richard Long, combined music, speeches, and a solemn candle service. Eighth grade student Jaime Minor lit 41 candles for each of the Vermont men and women who lost their lives serving the United States during the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. The ceremony attracted two dozen veterans from the area, with many wearing uniforms describing their service. Three students read their winning essays for the Brattleboro VFW Carl M. Dessaint Post #1034's annual Patriot's Pen Essay Contest. All three top winners were students from Kurn Hattin. Each won an award for their essays responding to the theme 'Why I Appreciate



America's Veterans.' Maia Brow, 8th grade Kurn Hattin student and first place winner, read her essay along with Hayley Labrecque (second place) and Reginald Watson (third place). Maia's essay will now be entered into the VFW district competition. The Patriot's Pen Essay winners were also guests of honor at a dinner at the VFW in Brattleboro, Vermont. The Post Commander, Mark Truhan, and Darlene Nebelski, President of the Post Auxiliary, came to the school on Friday, November 14th and presented all of the Kurn Hattin students who participated in the essay contest with certificates of appreciation, as well as recognizing the top three contest winners. Pictured are two young students presenting worn flags collected at the local cemeteries to be burned at a Flag Retirement Ceremony later that day.

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In March of 2014, fourteen year old Madison (Maddy) Schumacher participated in an annual project that changed her life. "Kids Helping Kids" during project week was coordinated with her classmates from New Hampton School in New Hampshire, a boarding and day school for grades 9-12. The purpose of project week is to provide their high school students time for an extended investigation of key issues through educational opportunities not possible in the standard classroom setting. The school has a partnership with Kurn Hattin Homes to be used as a learning site. The

New Hampton kids cheerfully participated in a number of projects on-campus, including tutoring young readers and mentoring the younger children on campus. Working with children in need had a profound impact on Maddy. "She came home filled with purpose," remembers her father. "She said she wished she were rich so that she could give a lot of money to the school." She decided to start The M.A.D.D.Y. Fund (Making a Difference for Disadvantaged Youth) by coordinating a number of fundraising projects with the help of friends, family, and other members of the community. They held yard sales with donated items to raise funds, and also had collection cans on-site at events. Maddy collaborated with all of the dormitories on campus to hold two clothing drives, while providing incentives such as a pizza party for her fellow students. In the end, Maddy raised over \$3,400 for Kurn Hattin Homes for Children, and delivered 25 boxes of clothing. As she presented the check to the school she thanked the young children for inspiring her

to "do good in the world." Her father Doug Schumacher smiled and shook his head, "It's really great when your own kids inspire you to be better."

There were several visitors and visits this fall. The Development Department staff at Kurn Hattin was busy with presentations this semester. Director of Development Kim Fine traveled to Fairfax, Virginia to attend the National Society of New England Women (NSNEW) Virginia Company Colony meeting and later to Lexington Kentucky to speak to the Blue Grass Colony. While in Kentucky, she was presented a plaque inducting her as an Honorable Kentucky Colonel signed by the Governor and Secretary of State. In December, Kim was also presented a \$500



donation to Kurn Hattin by the Edson Marine Corps League Detachment 379 Treasurer and Kurn Hattin alumnus Leo Lawrence, Class of 1942 of Rutland, Vermont (Pictured). Assistant Director of Development F. Lisa Bloch presented to the Green Mountain Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the D.A.R, Cameo Club, in Montpelier, Vermont. Sandy Plimpton Nowell and her sister Susan Fodor from Wellsburg, West Virginia drove up from Westhampton, New York to tour the campus and peruse the Archives for photos of their father, Allen Plimpton, Class of 1926. They were thrilled to find pictures for their family albums. Lorna Wright and her husband Roger came to visit as well, and enjoyed hearing the children practicing the Vermont State Song for the Vermont Gubernatorial Inauguration. Lorna is the National Chair of the National Society of New England Women (NSNEW) for New England Kurn Hattin Homes, and brought holiday cards with gifts for the children from the Wisconsin Voyageurs Colony. Rachel Childs Rose of Brookfield, Vermont, toured campus in December. She was the music teacher at Saxtons River, Vermont and Bellows Falls, Vermont Elementary Schools from 1970 to 1977. During that time she taught piano lessons to a boy who attended Kurn Hattin.

It was another festive holiday season filled with the spirit of giving, thanks to the generosity of our friends. Tim Mollica of Christmas Trees of Vermont in Springfield, Vermont and his family donated a number of trees, hand-picked by the children, to help deck the halls of Kurn Hattin's buildings and cottages.
