

RESIDENTIAL Unsung Heroes

In addition to the houseparents, the Assistant Residential Directors make the residential department hum along smoothly. Carol Bazin has been with Kurn Hattin for 28 years and MaryJo Dansereau for 23 years. Both started out as houseparents. The Assistant Residential Directors (ARD) have a multi-faceted job. Along with daily student interaction and discipline, there is a host of other duties they are responsible for. Each ARD supervises half of the houseparents, is assigned to three cottages, and is responsible for all cottages while she is on duty. Both ARDs work evenings, weekends, holidays and vacations and maintain their CDL driver's licenses and often drive the big school buses on excursions.

Carol Bazin takes care of the clothes locker, campus store, purchasing of hygiene supplies, and the most important task for the students-student pay. Carol makes sure the students are paid for kitchen, dining room, campus chores, extra jobs and after school work. Carol also takes care of the Christmas Bazaar which is our largest fundraiser for the 8th grade class trip.

MaryJo is responsible for the mentor program, outside camps, data collection and behavior report letters to parents. With a few houseparents retiring and vacancies in houseparent positions, MaryJo has become a master at juggling the staff and asking for coverage with very little disruption to the students' lives, a priority for all of us. MaryJo is also in charge of our residential fleet. She coordinates the bus drivers, maintains documentation, distributes gas cards and works with Fleet Manager Real Bazin for vehicle maintenance.

Carol and MaryJo spend much of their time with students. Sometimes it's just for a "check in" when we see a student who needs extra support. Other times it's to discuss behavior. Students will come to the office to process with Mrs. Bazin and Mrs. "D". They work through the problem on a planning sheet and then come up with a plan so the problem doesn't keep occurring. Mrs. Bazin and Mrs. D. guide them through the process so they can make better choices, use some new skills, and work on the behavior. Some students do restitution through work in the school or outside; others head back to the cottage to do restitution with the houseparent or other students. Carol and MaryJo oversee this process and do it well. Students also come to the office for a quiet place or to chat. Carol and MaryJo welcome them and make them feel special.

This summer we were fortunate to have Susanna Compare '14, give back to Kurn Hattin while she was home on summer break from the Milton Hershey School. Carol gave her the monumental task of cleaning the clothes locker and the Christmas Bazaar room. Susanna rose to the occasion, and as Carol commented, "Was above and beyond my expectations." Susanna wrote a letter at the end of summer thanking us for the opportunity to spend time at Kurn Hattin, to help out by talking with students and helping them understand all Kurn Hattin has to offer and how to make the best of it. It was a win-win situation. We got help with two huge chores, and Susanna got to reconnect with staff and students. Carol did a wonderful job keeping Susanna busy, using her talents, and making her feel welcome and needed.

Carol and MaryJo are true assets to Kurn Hattin. Without them, the residential department would not run as smoothly. They support the staff, the children, and to my best fortune, they support me so I can do my job. They handle their tasks with grace, patience and professionalism. They truly are the unsung heroes of the residential department.

The road ahead is a lot less bumpy thanks to all of the generous supporters who contributed to Kurn Hattin's fundraising campaign for a new bus. With your help we raised the funds necessary to purchase a safe, efficient school bus. Each year, the children attend approximately 200 engagements off campus, including performances for the music program, intramural sports games, educational and recreational field trips, and community service activities and projects. It is truly wonderful to travel safely and comfortably to these destinations. Thank you for joining us on this journey.



This summer we had a ten-week summer program filled with arts and crafts, swim lessons, tutoring, archery, hikes, literacy, sport camps, technology wizard camps, horse program, farm, field games, board and card games, and field trips. We met together for lunch, auditorium games, and a large group game outside until snack time. Then the children could choose free swim, open gym, or game time in Haps Room. (Hap's Room is named for alumnus George "Hap" Pierce, who attended Kurn Hattin from 1909–1913. At age fifteen, he left to embark upon a 5-year plumbing apprenticeship and was the successful owner of his own plumbing business in the Bennington, Vermont region. Hap shared his success by giving back to the Kurn Hattin children as an adult. He was known for organizing fundraising drives on behalf of Kurn Hattin, arriving each December with a truck full of toys, clothing, and monetary donations from his community.) We took field trips on Wednesdays to the Boston Science Museum in Massachusetts; Magic Forest in Lake George, New York; Six Flags in Agawam, Massachusetts; Calvin Coolidge Homestead in Plymouth, New Hampshire; the Montshire Museum of Science in Norwich, Vermont; and to local lakes. Another highlight of the summer was a weekly science unit: Tech Wizards, taught by Debbie Fajans, from UVM Extension and Houseparent



Adam Lansberry; Archery, taught by houseparent Robert Anderson; and Baseball Camp taught by José Mendez' 64, and Food Services Director Richard Johnson. There were several overnight camping and cycling trips including to Cape Cod; the Christmas Tree Farm in Springfield, Vermont; and local camping and recreation areas. These trips and activities were made possible thanks to the generous support of our many Kurn Hattin friends and donors. Appreciation also goes out to all of the staff and volunteers who taught our children new skills, and supported their summer fun and safety.



Six of our 7th and 8th graders enjoyed a rare opportunity when they met U.S. Astronaut Clayton C. Anderson at the Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum. Anderson, who recently published his autobiography, The Ordinary Spaceman, spent 167 days living and working on the International Space Station, including more than forty hours of space walks. He retired in 2013 after a thirty-year career with NASA. The children were visiting Washington DC from June 19 to 22 to participate in the National Fellowship of Child Care Executives (NFCCE) Youth Leadership

Summit. Our students joined students from four participating children's homes from around the country to learn leadership skills, gain historical knowledge to build a sense of community and civic responsibility, and forge new partnerships across the country. Over four days, the children traveled, toured, and learned about the history and culture of the United States. They attended empowering leadership workshops helping them develop self-esteem and communication skills, and set both short and long-term goals. The classes were attended in the mornings, and in the afternoons the collective group visited educational museums, national monuments, and historic places. This special opportunity was made possible by fundraising events and a number of other donors and events including: Bellow Falls Rotary Club, NFCCE, Ben & Jerry's Foundation, bake sales and Kurn Hattin Day sales, the Spring Fling/Thomas Fahner 5K Fun Run, soup

and bread sales, and other 8th Grade Class of 2015 fundraisers. Thank you everyone who supported these efforts.

At the end of June, Magic Mountain Resort in Londonderry, Vermont hosted the 2015 Frendly Gathering (no "I" in friends), an annual music festival and family friendly event on the mountain. The event featured the popular Vermont-based quartet, "Twiddle," and a diverse line-up of styles and sounds from over 30 different bands. Twiddle is a favorite among snowboarders and festival-goers, appealing to a broad



range of age groups due to their positive message of finding peak experiences through music and healthy activities. Twiddle's White Light Foundation coordinated a fundraising raffle for the event to benefit two Vermont organizations, LoveYourBrain Foundation and Kurn Hattin Homes for Children. The raffle raised over \$2,000 which was split between the two organizations. For many years José Mendez, Class of 1964, has wanted to return to Kurn Hattin to teach baseball camp. This summer he made that happen and traveled all the way from California to coach a one-week intensive baseball and softball camp. José carefully instructed the boys and girls with clear tasks to practice, assigning individual and team-building exercises to help build their confidence and skill. Asked about his time coaching the summer session, he stressed the importance of spending uninterrupted time with children. "Whether it is teaching the kids to play

ball or just reading a book with them, that attention makes such a difference in their ability to listen, to focus, and to follow instructions." Kurn Hattin Coach Richard Johnson agreed, "José is a wonderful teacher

and by far the most knowledgeable guy I've ever met when it comes to the ins and outs of the game. I've learned a lot." José has always loved baseball and played for Kurn Hattin's Varsity Team. After graduating Kurn Hattin and high school, he was picked up by the Cape Cod College League. He even took a shot at the pro leagues, trying out for the Cincinnati Reds. At that time, he realized that it was important to diversify his talents. So he focused on his college education, graduating with a Major in Physical Education and a Minor in Spanish with a larger goal of teaching and coaching. His unique combination of skills enabled him to become the Athletic Director at Paul Revere Junior High in Brentwood, California for five years, and then at Los Angeles High School for thirty years before retiring. Before departing Kurn Hattin, Jose waved his arm out over the expansive meadows and cornfields of Kurn Hattin Homes, "This is it right here. This is the real Field of Dreams."

On April 14th, the children, led by Music Director Lisa Bianconi, sang a pitch-perfect "God Bless America" and "The Star Spangled Banner" at their first major sporting event engagement. The children opened the match-up between the two American Hockey League teams, the Wilkes-Barre Penquins and the Portland Pirates at the Cross Insurance Arena in Portland, Maine. The impressed crowd responded heartily in

appreciation. Afterward, the children were treated to prime seats to watch the game. For many, it was the first time that they had ever been to a professional ice hockey game. Since they were in Maine, the children cheered loudly for the Pirates. Though in the end, the Wilkes-Barre Penquins won the game. They enjoyed the fast-paced, high-decibel action; taking home autographs, a puck or two, and enough memories to last a lifetime. Thank you Kurn Hattin friend John Zimmerman for this special treat.



The students in our science classes were rising to new heights, thanks to Debbie Fajans, Site Coordinator from UVM Extension and the Tech Wizards program. The children learned about rocket science and technology and launched their own rockets at the conclusion of the study. 4-H Tech Wizards is a skill-building and mentoring program for under-served youth. Efforts focus on teaching STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) curriculum, as well as the important life skills of goal setting, critical thinking and communication. STEM topic areas are aerospace, digital photography, Global Positioning Satellite (GPS), robotics, videography, bridges, forestry and solar energy. Debbie came by to observe the launch and was given her own specially made rocket with her name on it to thank her. She has coordinated many STEM projects with the Kurn Hattin children.



The Kurn Hattin Holiday Bazaar was a great success this year. We raised over \$1,300. The proceeds from the Bazaar helps fund the 8th grade class trip in June. The Bazaar which is for the children, their families and the staff, is held in December before the children's Family Holiday Concert and the children's departure home for vacation. The class of 2015 thanks everyone who made donations, helped set up, wrapped gifts for the children, and cleaned up after all was done. We accept items throughout the year for the Bazaar. We

Since 1894, Kurn Hattin children and staff have sustained and nourished themselves by working the farm to provide food for the table. I remember the bushels of produce delivered to the Girls' Department where Miss Ward would teach us the joy of eating fresh produce from our own gardens. (Of course our appreciation was enhanced by the chance to see the boys who worked the farm.) We joined the 4-H Club and the Grange. We went to the Vermont Fair with the band or just for an outing. We loved the apples freshly picked from the trees in the fall. And spring, oh, that delicious maple syrup we took such pride in! We made it ourselves from the sap of tapped trees on campus. It was a way of life.

Farming and the study of agriculture have remained part and parcel of Kurn Hattin life today. Indeed, it has grown under the direction of past and current farm managers. Farm Manager Pat Barry is in his 5th year managing the farming program. Along with the children, he has been growing vegetables on 4.5 acres, raising pigs, making maple syrup along with Real Bazin, and apple cider from the apple tree grove. I am impressed that the children study in class and also get practical application. They are doing hands-on work, paying attention to detail, participating in team work, being good stewards to the land, trying new foods they've grown and communing with the natural world around them.

I am most grateful for my experience working on the farm. The children at the Homes today are learning important skills and practices and will garner the same appreciation of working the land.

He was very humble and proud of his job, and he always did his job well." While at Kurn Hattin, Steven learned useful manual skills such as how to use hand tools and repair things, and how to set-up and put together staging and lighting during the school's musical performances.


After high school, Steven served in the military for four years as a construction equipment repairman and wrecker driver, spending a year overseas in South Korea. He loved music, and his talent and dependability would eventually lead to working in the music industry doing set-up and staging in Nashville. He attended Auto Diesel College while continuing to do set-up work and eventually toured North America with the well-known top-selling country band, Rascal Flatts, as part of their crew.

When Steven became a father, he wanted more stability in his life so that he could spend more time with his young daughter. He leveraged the skills he had learned into a career specializing in Heavy Recovery, the towing and mobilization of large vehicles and equipment such as tractor trailers. Steven now works for Dad's Towing, a West Nashville, Tennessee wrecking and towing service, coordinating recovery. Not everyone can be licensed to drive a heavy recovery wrecker. It is a specialized skill that requires knowledge and experience in scene management, truck driving and crane operation, quick clearance, and safety regulations. Steven frequently has to remove huge damaged trucks and tractor trailers safely from potentially dangerous accident scenes under heavy traffic conditions, while coordinating with emergency personnel. The Counseling Center at Kurn Hattin has been very busy over the past several months. It is with pleasure that I have taken on the role of head of the department as Lead Counselor, and as such the daily operations and tasks have been redistributed. In addition to leading the department, I continue to offer counseling to students and am thoroughly enjoying the mix of my leadership role and providing therapeutic support. This summer we have been extra busy conducting interviews for prospective students, going on excursions with the summer recreation staff, offering counseling as needed to our students, and welcoming our incoming students and their families. In the summer and throughout the year, we help our students adjust to their program and daily campus life. We get acquainted with the children, develop an understanding of their strengths and individual needs, and identify ways to best meet those needs therapeutically.

The Counseling Center has also welcomed a new counselor, Tress Zuverino, to the counseling team. "Miss Tress" is a skilled professional and is quickly developing therapeutic relationships with her students. Her perspective and passion for her job are illustrated in her following words:

"Joining the Kurn Hattin Community in the middle of the long cold winter was a bright spot in my life. I feel privileged to work alongside capable and caring individuals who are cultivating resiliency, hope, self-esteem, and discipline in children.

I look forward to seeing the smiling faces of the students every day. Working in a community that focuses on creating a safe, positive, and nurturing environment naturally speaks to my strengths and creativity. In my counseling work, I rely on the power of relationships to create a trusting and accepting environment knowing how rewarding and healing an experience can be when one is not being judged or evaluated. As children feel understood, they are safe enough to explore their thoughts, feelings, and behaviors often resulting in an acceptance and willingness to change.

Working with the children at Kurn Hattin, I have been struck by the level of maturity, manners, and selfawareness that many possess. I am often awed by their enthusiasm to have counseling and willingness to engage in the therapeutic process. What makes Kurn Hattin so effective is knowing that the work I do with children in counseling is reinforced in the greater community by their experiences at school and in the cottages. I cannot say enough about the positive impact that this community has on the lives of the children who are loved enough by their parents to do what is best for them and send them to Kurn Hattin Homes for their upbringing and education."
