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# Two Heads are better than one

On January 11, 2013 two familiar, friendly faces on campus assumed their new roles as Co-Executive Directors of Kurn Hattin Homes. Tom Fahner and Connie Sanderson are sharing the Homes' lead administrative duties, with Tom as head of Residential and Academic Life, and Connie overseeing Business Operations and Institutional Advancement.

Board President, Charles Kelsey, announced the new appointments in a letter to all staff, saying the new team leadership model will strengthen Kurn Hattin's services and position the organization for the future. "It aligns our resources to focus fully on each service entity," Kelsey said, "as well as ensures that the core business of Kurn Hattin is protected and thrives in the coming years."

To most in the Kurn Hattin community, Tom and Connie need little introduction. Each of them has already made many significant positive contributions to the organization in their respective previous leadership roles at the Homes, Tom as Director of Residential and Educational Services and Connie as Director of Development and Public Relations.

Connie came to Kurn Hattin as a Development Officer in 1988 and held the position of Director of Development from 1990 until the present. During her tenure as head of development, the organization saw its endowment double. Connie also developed the highly successful Public Relations program, as well as a thriving Charitable Gift Annuity program. In addition, she instituted the creation of the Kurn Hattin archives, and advanced the Alumni Association to the active organization it is today. She lives in Westminster with her husband, Lee. The couple has one son, Todd, of Marlborough, CT.

Tom joined the Kurn Hattin community as school principal in 1989 and became Director of Residential and Educational Services in 1993. Under Tom's direction, the Kurn Hattin school



implemented multi-aged ability grouping in classes in order to more effectively serve students' needs. Tom is responsible for expanding the summer program to its current vibrancy and including summer sport camps in its offerings. He also started wonderful community events, such as Family Days and Spring Fling, now traditions on campus. Tom resides on the Kurn Hattin Homes campus with his wife Donna, a PE teacher at Kurn Hattin. They have three children, Kelly, Kim, and Christopher.

There's no doubt that Tom and Connie make a great team. In addition to the two decades they've spent working together, both are originally from Long Island, so there's a common history and a shared sense of humor between them that carries through in their professional relationship. To their new responsibilities, they bring not only their individual strengths, experience, and expertise, but also a deep mutual respect, a collaborative spirit, and a shared understanding of what really matters at Kurn Hattin—the children and their families.



"The main thing we have in common is that we are both totally invested in these children," says Tom, "That comes first before everything else. It's not about what's advantageous for us; it's what's best for them."

The shift to having two Co-Executive Directors has already proven to be a positive change on campus, and Tom and Connie agree that the benefits are far-reaching. Both say that sharing responsibilities and decisions has given them a wonderful sense of optimism and possibility. "What the Board has done is amazing," Connie says, "Tom and I will be able to work more intensively and effectively to get things done. We really get to put our whole heart and soul into the areas that we are overseeing."

"It's reassuring to have another person to go to," adds Tom, "We can bounce things off each other, discuss ideas, and look at things from a different angle. When one of us has an area where we need to grow, we can rely on the other person to help fill that void."

Shared roots, shared responsibilities, and a shared passion for Kurn Hattin's mission of transforming the lives of children and their families forever.



# school Life

Our faculty continues to meet the needs of our diverse population of students, encouraging them to progress in all of their academic areas. Our very youngest students are proud to say that they are all reading! Elsewhere in the building, one group read *The Last of the Mohicans*, while others read and discussed *The Red Badge of Courage*. Our students have studied the poems of Robert Frost and visited the Frost farm in Shaftsbury, Vermont.



They have written their own poetry and taken beautiful photographs. For the holidays, some studied *A Christmas Carol* by Charles Dickens. Some of our students went on to compose essays for a contest sponsored by Kurn Hattin volunteer and donor, Mrs. Frank J. Prindl. In our library, Kurn Hattin students checked out over 800 books since August and read many more in the Reading Room. They read 241 books during November alone!

Kurn Hattin students studied civics using the nationally recognized "We the People" curriculum. This fall, forty-three Kurn Hattin students participated in the Veterans of Foreign Wars Patriot's Pen Essay Contest. Two of our students moved on to district competition and another placed third in the local competition. We had the largest number of entries of all school participants in the competition this year. In our science classes, Kurn Hattin students researched famous ship wrecks, learned about health and nutrition, studied flight and even built bridges. They learned the cider-making process and provided us all with a taste of the sweet juice they squeezed from local fruit. Our middle school students get PLENTY of practice writing their science essays!

At Kurn Hattin, we offer our students many novel learning experiences to supplement our more traditional academic curricula. For the holidays, our farm manager and science teachers worked with our students to make beautiful holiday centerpieces and wreaths with greens, pine cones and ribbon to take home and give to loved ones or friends. Some of our students decorated bags for Meals on Wheels, contributing to our annual Kurn Hattin tradition.

In our physical education classes, our students have been introduced to a variety of activities with wellness and movement being the primary goals. While on campus it is common to see groups of our students walking to our gymnasium or playing on our fields. Our winter activities include skiing, snowboarding, snowshoeing, winter hiking, digital photography, woodworking, arts and crafts and line dancing. Our students all take part in weekly social skills classes as well, which is taught collaboratively by school faculty, counselors and



residential staff. The music department has had a very busy year.

Our students have been working persistently and have represented our school community with grace and aplomb. Thanks to the entire Kurn Hattin staff for working so diligently to provide this rich array of experiences for our students!

# INDIVIDUAL VS. GROUP Counseling

The Counseling Center offers therapeutic group counseling to a number of the students. "Some students need skill development more than a venue to reflect, process, and "work through" challenges in their lives. While individual support continues to be quite beneficial "to many students, the needs of some are more suited for a group setting. The groups which have been offered so far have been a new students' group for older boys, an anger management group for older boys, self-esteem group for older boys, a "girls' group" for middle school girls (various topics), and a social skills group for younger girls. In addition, there is an ongoing facilitated mentoring "group" between the 7th & 8th grade boys and the youngest boys. Soon there will also be the annual "Good Grief Group" which is colead by a member of the counseling staff and a volunteer facilitator from Brattleboro Area Hospice.

The type of group, including the topic and the age/gender of the participants, is solely determined by student need and interest. For example, there was a new student's group for older boys because there were a lot of new, older boys this year and the counselor for these students assessed that they would prefer, and benefit more from, a group format. There were not as many new older girls, and those that were new, seemed to make good use of their individual counseling appointments to help with their transition to Kurn Hattin.

The counseling staff also is sensitive to students' self-concept with regards to the name for a group and how it is facilitated. For example, the self-esteem group is called "Sense of Self". Most groups are a combination of activities, discussion, and psycho-education (i.e. providing information about emotional/behavioral dynamics). Some groups are based on published materials (i.e. the anger management group, called "Seeing Red," is based on a specific curriculum) and others are developed by the counselor leading the group. Both students and staff have found these groups to be beneficial and enjoyable.

# following in my Footsteps

Marvin Claude Coble was lucky. His grandmother was able to care for him and his older brother when his mother died. "She did a really great job," Claude admits. But just the way things go sometimes, he started having trouble in school and eventually came to live at Kurn Hattin as a 6th-grader in 1966. "The nice people, especially the Rogers and the Watsons, helped me immeasurably in adjusting to my new environment." Sports were important to Claude and with the changes of the seasons, he played football,



basketball and baseball. For music study, the trombone and the drums kept him busy. "The social skills classes and discipline I received and having a positive attitude helped me become very independent and a survivor in any situation. I learned acceptance and tolerance. I really credit that to Kurn Hattin. Kurn Hattin gave me independence." Claude continued to advance his skills and career. However, the many challenges of raising a child in today's society posed some issues. One of which was that his and his wife Paula's daughter, Brianna, a bright and talented young girl, wasn't reaching her full potential in the school she attended. So they contacted the home and school that put Claude on the track to his success—Kurn Hattin.



Brianna is in her second year at the Homes and is on the Honor Roll. She's a drummer, in the Select Choir and Jazz Band, and is a great basketball player. "When I pick her up to take her home for a school break, she asks if there is anything she can do to help. I was shocked at first. Is this my same girl?" Claude laughs. "She's confident and polite. With her head held high, Brianna adds, "It was amazing to be able to follow in my father's footsteps. I came here for a better education and surroundings. Before I came, I didn't have as many friends as I

have now. School is definitely better." Claude says he's indebted to Kurn Hattin. "This place transformed my life. I would not have had the life I have, had I not come here. And now, in a time of need, it's also helping my wife and me with our daughter. She'll do just fine now too." Paula agrees, "I feel that Claude is a whole person, because he is able to think on his feet. He is very versatile and communicates well and confidently with everyone. I believe the education and strong foundation he received as a child at this home for children gave him that foundation. I am happy that Brianna is also able to learn the important things in life, much of which I am not able to show her. I believe that she will grow to be a strong and independent woman and for this reason I am delighted and feel blessed that she is here."

Claude and I took a walk across the road on campus to a big shady tree. "Look, I planted this tree in 1967. It's grown big and strong." Claude smiles proudly. "I learned to embrace life. Take the good with the bad and keep moving. Keep smiling. Brianna is learning these important things too."

The Kurn Hattin Music Program has been making some great music with very talented children. The Jazz Band and Select Choir have performed several concerts. They have traveled to Boston and Peabody, Massachusetts to play, they've performed for the Kurn Hattin Veteran's Day Celebration, marched in the Westminster Halloween Parade,

practiced for the Big E, Springfield, Massachusetts parade (but it got washed out), auditioned and made the first round so far for the Western Massachusetts PBS television ttation WGBY's *Together In Song* Choral Competition; and performed with Cape Breton Grammy Award winning fiddler Natalie MacMaster at the Bellows Falls Opera House. They've been selected for and have sung solos in the Connecticut Valley District Schools Music Festival, and performed at the Walpole, New Hampshire and Manchester, Vermont Congregational Churches. They have also performed for the Brattleboro Rotary Club; and Kurn Hattin's Christmas Visitors' Day and Family Day Christmas concerts. Each day we read and respond to emails of every type, from the urgent to those that are of a business or personal nature. A curious email address from the Ukraine, 6,000 miles away and yet so close, appeared one evening in Connie Sanderson's inbox, with an inquiry that would pave the way for a joyous and emotional family visit to see the childhood home of a beloved father and grandfather, John Newill, who lived at Kurn Hattin Homes from 1917-1920. The email was a stab in the dark for grandson Ken Sears, who was doing extensive genealogical research to find out where his grandfather had grown up. Little did Ken know that not only had John spent several years at Kurn Hattin Homes, but that in our Archives were original letters dating back to the 1920's—letters which gave Ken and

his mother Mary Ann, from Texas, and her sisters Marguerite and Florence, from New York, a new understanding of John, a man who had been a quiet and loving presence all their lives. Seeing the farm where their father had worked as a boy was one of the many moving moments of their visit on a sunny day last August. To finally know that he had been loved and cared for in such a nurturing setting was a relief to the three sisters, who had always wondered about their father's childhood. In a card sent after the trip to Kurn Hattin, Ken wrote: "Please accept this expression





of our esteem for your wonderful work in honor of our father and grandfather, John L. Newill, who spent the happiest years of his boyhood at Kurn Hattin Homes." For Ken and his mother and aunts, the click of his send button on a blustery winter day brought a new joy and peace to their lives forever. Watching the boys still and calm as she worked was awe inspiring. When she finished, she brushed away the loose hairs and let the boys admire her work and their fresh new looks. In six weeks, fifteen more boys will have their turn and quiet time with Ms. Carroll.

In September, Kurn Hattin welcomed Trustee Charles P. Kelsey of Deerfield, New Hampshire as Kurn Hattin's new President of the Board. Kelsey is Vice President of Resident Life at Riverwoods in Exeter, New Hampshire—a continuing care retirement community serving 600 seniors. Involvement with Kurn Hattin runs deep for Kelsey, who first became involved with the organization as an Incorporator 25 years ago when his stepmother, Pat Kelsey, was Kurn Hattin's Board President. "Having lost my own mother at a young age, with three siblings, it was challenging. I've always held a strong compassion for the needs of those less fortunate." Connie Sanderson,

Kurn Hattin's new Co-Executive Director and Director of Development for the past 25 years, added, "Charlie Kelsey brings a new way of thinking to Kurn Hattin Homes. His vision is broad and diverse. He keeps the future success of the organization in front of him at all times, and his efforts and dedication are felt by all who come in contact with him.

He put his hand on our son's shoulder and spoke sternly, "There is only one kind of work around this house and that is work that needs to be done. Get on with the dishes."

Let's go even further back to the 50s when I was at Kurn Hattin. There too we each had our work assignments and I never heard a word about girls' or boys' work. I soon learned that this was the way it went at my new home. I will admit that I loved the kitchen assignment because I could learn from my house mother, Miss Ward. Work contributed to life at Kurn Hattin. And you learned to take pride in your work knowing others depended on your efforts.

I've returned to the Homes many times since the 50s and always found that the children were about their work, contributing to the life of the others. They seem to know that there is only one kind of work and that's work to be done. Thanks Kurn Hattin staff for this valuable lesson.
