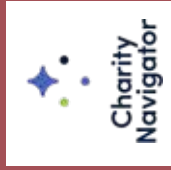

Kurn Hattin marked the end of the 2024–2025 academic year with a joyful graduation celebration honoring five outstanding 8th-grade graduates. The ceremony, filled with music, heartfelt speeches, and well wishes, brought together friends, family, staff, alumni, and supporters. Following the Invocation, Flag Salute, and *Star-Spangled Banner*, class Salutatorian Phoenix Schell delivered a thoughtful address, likening his Kurn Hattin journey to a basketball game. He reflected on the teamwork and support that helped him score this victory, acknowledging those who guided him along the way. Former Executive Director Steve Harrison encouraged the graduates to see commencement not as an end, but as a beginning full of possibility. your best." Valedictorian Rezig Akot also expressed deep gratitude to the many who helped him succeed—especially his mother. In a touching moment, he invited her to the stage and presented her with a box of awards he had been quietly saving for years. After the presentation of diplomas and special awards, guests gathered for a celebratory luncheon to honor the achievements of the Kurn Hattin Class of 2025.



Kurn Hattin Student's Artwork Chosen for GLASSTASTIC 2025

For the seventh time in 14 years, the Brattleboro Museum & Art Center in Vermont invited artists in grades K–6 to let their imaginations soar for GLASSTASTIC—an exhibition where drawings of imaginary creatures are transformed into one-of-a-kind glass sculptures by professional artists.

This year, from a field of more than 1,000 submissions, Kurn Hattin 5th grader Desiree Lake was one of just 20 students selected. Her colorful cactus character, named "Cactus," captured the attention of artist Josh Bernbaum, who brought her feline to life in glass form. Bernbaum, who has used cacti in his art before, said something about Desiree's art spoke to him. When asked how it felt to see "Cactus" transformed into a work of glass art, Desiree humbly replied, "It felt good." Congratulations, Desiree, on this incredible achievement!



FROM CONCEPT TO CREATION: KH Students Bring Art to Life

As part of Kurn Hattin's **Career Awareness Program (CAP)**, 8th-grade students visited **Len-Tex Corporation**, a global manufacturer of vinyl wallcoverings in North Walpole, NH. Guided by CAD Designer Dan Valerio, students designed their own wallcoverings, experiencing the full creative process—from concept, through digital design, to finished product. Their original designs were later featured in Keene's annual **ArtWalk**, the city's longest-running community art event.

ArtWalk participation didn't end there—students also contributed to the **Community Mural Project** by painting cheerful paper pooches, which will be added to the mural that currently brightens up the corner of Main Street and Eagle Court in downtown Keene. Participating in both projects gave students the rewarding experience of seeing ideas brought to life through collaboration—an inspiring reminder to look for art in everything, everywhere, every day.



FROM CLASSROOM TO CAPITOL: Kurn Hattin Students Experience Civics in Action

Vermont State Representative Michelle Bos-Lun visited Kurn Hattin to speak with the middle school civics class. Her engaging presentation, *Making Laws, Making Change*, showed students how a bill becomes a law and how public policy is shaped. Civics Teacher and Student Council Advisor Deborah Velto stressed the value of real-world connections: "I want students to understand their civic duty, to know their ideas matter, their voices can be heard, and they can make a difference."



Following the visit, the Kurn Hattin Statehouse Singers were invited to open a Vermont Devotional in the House Chamber by performing the state song, *These Green Mountains*. The experience gave students a chance to reconnect with Rep. Bos-Lun and observe the legislature in action—a powerful reminder of how classroom learning can translate into real-world civic engagement.

FROM CHAOS TO COMPASSION

Tayla McAlpine's Journey from Kurn Hattin to Nursing

"This place has my heart."

That's what Tayla McAlpine says about her workplace, Cedarcrest in Keene, NH, a specialized pediatric medical facility and school providing comprehensive services to children with complex medical and developmental needs. But her road to Cedarcrest actually began in 2003, when she arrived at Kurn Hattin as a residential student.

"Kurn Hattin formed the base of my success," Tayla says. "I didn't do well in public school. When I got to Kurn Hattin, I was about two years behind academically. But with smaller classes, clear rules, dedicated teachers and houseparents, and a lot of individual support, everything changed. My life went from chaos to structure. They saw potential in me when I didn't see it in myself."

After Tayla graduated from Kurn Hattin in 2006, she went on to prep school in Hoosick, NY, which was funded through a Kurn Hattin scholarship. She then went on to pursue a nursing career, ultimately landing at Cedarcrest. Working her way up from LNA to Nurse Manager, Tayla has proven that the guidance she received early in her educational journey led her to the right destination.

"Tayla has an exceptional gift. The children at Cedarcrest have challenging needs and some are non-verbal, but she knows them all well and has a way of bringing out the best in each child," said Dr. Scott Schroeder, former Cedarcrest Interim Medical Director.

Not only does Tayla have a gift when relating to the children, she also has an especially compassionate way of relating to their families. "I see a different side of families in crisis. I can give them the support they need, just like Kurn Hattin gave me."

When Tayla isn't hard at work loving her job, she's home loving her own family. Tayla and her husband, Ryan, have been together for more than 12 years. They have three children—Arya age 7, Aiden age 4, and Noah age 18 months—and a happy work/life balance. She says, "Ryan is so supportive. I couldn't do this without him."

Looking back on her life experiences so far, Tayla says, "I wouldn't change a thing."



TAYLA'S MESSAGE TO OTHER KURN HATTIN KIDS:

"You can create the life you want based on the decisions you make. It's okay to try and fail, but keep trying. Your life is up to you."

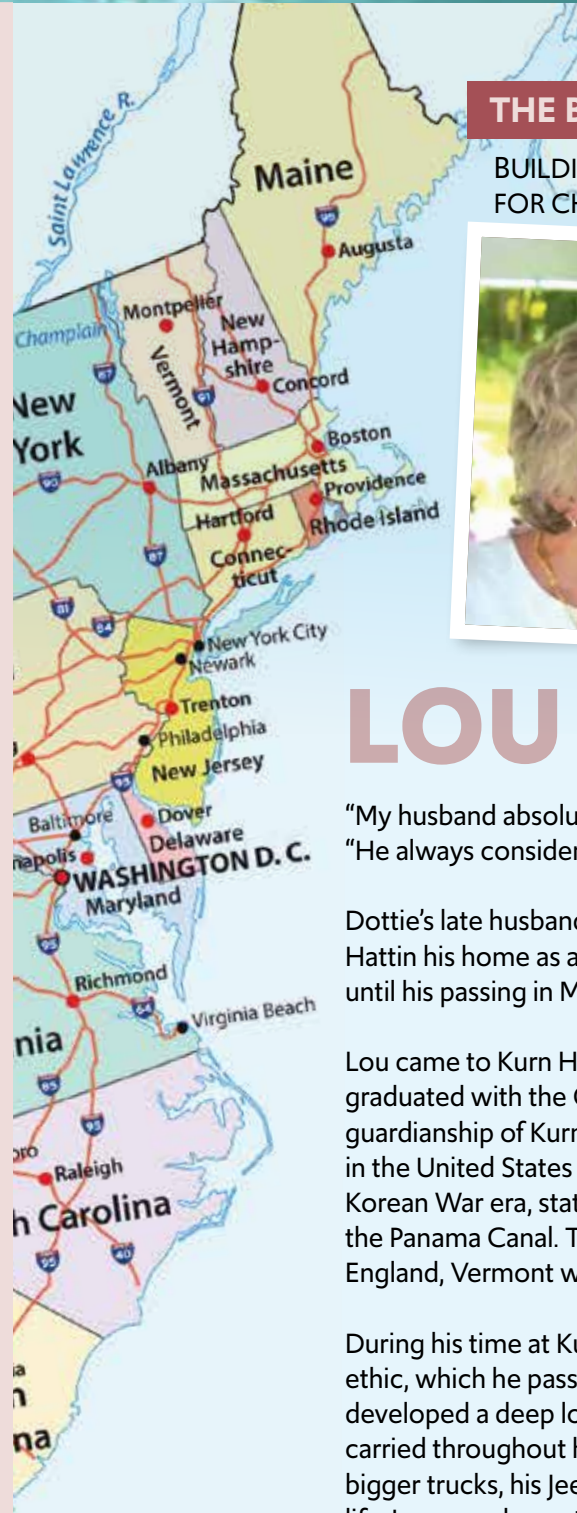

LOU GILBERT

“My husband absolutely loved Kurn Hattin,” recalls Dottie Gilbert. “He always considered it his home.”

Dottie’s late husband, Louis Edward “Lou” Gilbert, made Kurn Hattin his home as a child and continued to hold it in his heart until his passing in March of 2025.

Lou came to Kurn Hattin when he was just five years old and graduated with the Class of 1950. At age 17, while under the guardianship of Kurn Hattin Director Pete Mayo, Lou enlisted in the United States Army. He served for three years during the Korean War era, stationed in Panama, where he helped guard the Panama Canal. Though his service took him far from New England, Vermont was always home in Lou’s heart.

During his time at Kurn Hattin, Lou developed a strong work ethic, which he passed along to their seven children. Lou also developed a deep love for anything with a motor, which he carried throughout his lifetime. Tractors, trucks, big trucks, bigger trucks, his Jeep CJ, his BSA motorcycle—if it roared to life, Lou was drawn to it. Some say he might’ve had diesel fuel running through his veins!

After his military service, Lou found work in Connecticut, where he met Dottie. Their brief and romantic courtship led to a long, loving marriage. Lou built his career as a truck driver, running routes up and down the East Coast. Eventually, he drove logging trucks for a local Vermont company, which allowed him to stay closer to home. In retirement, he happily drove a dump truck in the summers—just for the love of it.

Dottie remembers that Lou wasn't particularly lucky with money, but he was incredibly rich in love, family, and friendship. "We had a lot of love, but we really didn't have much money while the kids were growing up," she says. "Things got better later. Still, every week, Lou would buy two lottery tickets. It was always his dream to hit the jackpot and give the winnings to Kurn Hattin."

Lou never won the lottery, but he hit the jackpot in so many other ways. Dottie says, "He was a good man—a generous man—who gave freely to others. Every year he donated to Bennington's food pantries, bought Christmas gifts for families in need, and even spent his COVID-19 stimulus check at the local soup kitchen."

Kurn Hattin changed Lou's life—gave him structure, purpose, and a foundation that shaped his future.

When their children were grown and out of the nest, Lou and Dottie became snowbirds, spending winters at their trailer in Fort Pierce, FL. As their 65th wedding anniversary approached, Lou's health was in decline, but the couple was grateful to celebrate the milestone surrounded by friends and family. The party was a joyful tribute to love, laughter, and a life well lived. Lou and Dottie received \$2,000 in anniversary gifts from loved ones—and true to Lou's spirit, they donated the entire sum to Kurn Hattin.

"He wanted to do that," Dottie says. "He loved Kurn Hattin. Couldn't stop talking about it. Every time we drove by, he'd say, 'There's my home.' And he told me more than once, 'Dottie, if I had my life to live over again, I'd go to Kurn Hattin.'"

Lou was a good man, a devoted husband, a loving father and grandfather, a loyal friend, and a neighbor who believed in giving back.

As one final gesture of kindness, in Lou's obituary, the Gilbert family asked people to make contributions to Kurn Hattin.

Though Lou is gone, he will never be forgotten by those who had the privilege of knowing him. His legacy of love, kindness, and generosity will live on.

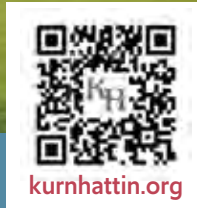
